<p><b>Induced joyfulness.</b></p> <p><i>The yielding line at the top induces.</i> <i>His virtue is not brilliant</i></p>	<p><b>Shadowy* usurpation</b></p> <p><small>* For "shadow", the received text reads "to draw, to extend"</small></p>	<p><b>Joy in the form of allurement *.</b></p> <p><i>This sort of joy is experienced by the unenlightened.</i></p> <p><small>* This suggests the superficial joy offered by attractions that would make no appeal to the Superior Man.</small></p>	<p><b>The topmost line, divided, shows the pleasure (of its subject) in leading and attracting others: His (virtue) is not yet brilliant.</b></p> <p><i>The topmost line, divided, shows its subject with (even) his head immersed. The position is perilous.</i></p>	<p><b>Seductive joyousness.</b></p> <p><i>The reason why the six at the top seduces to pleasure is that it is not bright.</i></p>
